Subject: Disparity of Services to Taxes Paid to OID

CC: Mr. Bryan Whitemyer City Manager

Let me first state that I admire OID because I perceive them as a well run and efficient organization. But, I also admire the concept of obtaining value for money spent, most particularly tax money. It is in that spirit that the following presentation is made.

The City responded to Item F4 of the Civil Grand Juries question regarding how to improve the disparity between the annual taxes of \$1.07 million paid to OID by the citizens of Oakdale and the services they receive. I find the cities answer to the potential additional services to be received from OID to be misleading.

The City, in their response, highlights a Mutual Aid Agreement between the City and OID as a value to be received. However, if the actual agreement follows the current Draft Agreement, what would take place is a situation where if either OID or the City needed assistance, in certain defined areas, and if the provider of service felt like it, they could provide assistance. The provider of service would be paid, by the requesting party, for the labor, equipment, time and materials used in the response. If the City were the requesting party they would pay for the assistance given. I am unable to see any tax related value in this simple business arrangement.

Another item offered as a value is a Cooperative Action Plan. The first item in the Draft of that plan is the foregoing Mutual Aid Agreement. The second item in the Action Plan is the conversion of the city parks from city water to OID irrigation water with the net result of an annual savings of ground water of approx. 567 acre feet. This would have a positive effect on the supply of available potable water at a minimum cost.

Action item #3 is a commercial venture which could possibly provide a fiscal benefit to the City while it will have an equal or greater benefit to OID. This item provides for upgrading the city water treatment plant to improve the quality of water so that 2000 acre feet can be reused as irrigation water.

Two of the four responses to the Civil Grand Juries Item F4 question (Mutual Aide, and Action item # 1) are the same thing and do not, in my view, constitute a benefit to the city that would warrant tax support, one response is a commercial venture (Action Item: #3) and the fourth (Action Item: #2) is relatively inexpensive onetime cost that does not rise to the level of the amount of annual taxation being addressed.

However the Grand Juries involvement has exposed a potential benefit to the city based upon the annual reservation of 10,000 acre feet of water to the City of Oakdale by what is described as a "firm" Right. This water is from the 600,000 acre feet of water allocated to OID/SSJID from New Melones allotment. An estimate of this potential could not be made at this time because I have not received a response to my Records Request for the Terms under which this Right operates. However, some sense of this potential can be taken from the fact of the very public sale of water to San Francisco for \$300 an acre foot. Later sales have been substantially higher.

Mayor and the City Council of Oakdale, California

The tax charges and lack of equitable service levels have gone on for decades with no attempt to resolve the situation. It is my sincere hope that the Civil Grand Juries revelations will lead to the City Council creating circumstances for tax relief and/or sources of income which will abate or slow down local governments' incessant cry for increased taxes and fees; while at the same time being equitable for OID.

I. BACKGROUND

There are many locations in the City's Sewer Collection System that are effected by inflow and infiltration of storm water. The City currently has no way to monitor how much of this flow is entering the system. Inflow and infiltration is a problem in numerous ways. The flow that enters the system eventually makes is way to the WWTP and must be treated. This extra water also causes issues with the collections system by taking up valuable space needed by the wastewater. Hydraulic overloading of pipes can easily occur if the inflow and infiltration rate exceeds the capacity of the system. The additional flows are also accompanied by a flushing of the sewer system, potentially moving settled material down the line and causing blockages. By purchasing the monitoring equipment, City staff can install the data loggers in known trouble areas to determine what type of preventative maintenance needs to take place. Eliminating the inflow and infiltration will allow for a healthier sewer system, reduced sanitary sewer overflows (SSO's), reduced maintenance, and an increase in capacity during we weather events at the WWTP.

II. DISCUSSION

Staff contacted Ponton Industries, Inc. regarding their equipment. The cost of the two units is as follows.

I. BACKGROUND

In June of 2015, Quality Services, Inc. performed a Cross Connection Control Survey for the City of Oakdale. The results of this survey included the location of multiple locations within the City's water system that still need to be protected with a backflow prevention device. The City is currently working towards handling these issues on a priority driven basis. The property located at 550/560 Armstrong Way was categorized as a Priority 1, which means it is a direct cross-connection to a potential health hazard and should be taken care of as quickly as possible in order to protect the water system.

II. DISCUSSION

City Staff contacted Michael Wheeler Construction, Inc. for a quote for services. This type of work is usually performed by City Staff. However, due to the size of the water main, staff sought the experience and expertise of their emergency contractor, Michael Wheeler, Inc. Wheeler has installed a number of devices at this size and larger, and also assisted in the design and specifications of this project. The specified material, which is an 8" Fire Series Compound meter designed for systems feeding a building that is equipped with overhead sprinklers for fire suppression, as well as an 8" backflow and cage assembly. The urgency of this situation, Wheeler's schedule, and previous experience with the City is the reason for the single quote for services.

Opportunity Stanislaus and the City of Oakdale Regarding Economic Development Services Provided by Opportunity Stanislaus to the City of Oakdale for the years of 2017 to 2021 in the annual amount of \$17,000.00 from Fund 110-1910-419-16-05 – General Government and Authorize the City Manager to Execute the MOU

I. BACKGROUND

The Opportunity Stanislaus (OS) and the City of Oakdale, (CITY) intend to work together through the implementation of the Countywide Economic Development Plan and Marketing Strategy focused on business development activities throughout Stanislaus County. This Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) serves as a guideline to describe the actions that both parties should take in order for the Economic Development Plan and Marketing Strategy to be successful.

The purpose of this Memorandum is to facilitate the Alliance and the City of Oakdale desire to effectively communicate strategies and information with local and regional partners that will maximize their contribution toward the achievement of Oakdale economic development goals. Further, this Memorandum of Understanding establishes the parameters for a successful partnership between the Alliance and the City of Oakdale and outlines the general responsibilities to be carried out by both parties.

II. DISCUSSION

This Memorandum of Understanding is a non-binding contract. However this agreement establishes the basic tenets of a collaborative working relationship between the City of Oakdale and the Alliance to create more jobs for Oakdale and the region, but does not impose a legal obligation on either party. Together, the City of Oakdale and the Alliance will:

- 1. Work together to identify target sectors for joint initiatives including, but not limited to biotechnology, agribusiness, manufacturing, clean energy, environmental sciences, and information and communication technologies;
- 2. Work together to identify opportunities for strategic partnerships and alliances between private sector companies in Oakdale and the Stanislaus County Region;
- 3. Explore opportunities for joint trade promotion and joint promotional activities related to the tourism, cultural and sports sectors;

- 4. Exchange best practices/lessons learned in assisting the private sector with inland port development;
- 5. Examine options for co-operative activity to facilitate development of strategic partnerships/ collaborations between the jurisdictions' respective inland ports, particularly as they relate to value-added and complementary services supporting their respective business communities; and
- 6. Examine options for co-operative activity in existing and emerging knowledge/innovation economy partnerships in the Midwest; and
- 7. Leverage collaborative efforts amongst members throughout Stanislaus County and the Region with a particular focus on trade and business development, knowledge/innovation economy development, life sciences, biotechnology, and information technology development.

The City of Oakdale and OS recognize the benefits of ongoing, regular contact between their respective organizations to promote economic development and job creation and identify areas in which there are opportunities for joint co-operation.

The following are general actions and activities to be undertaken by Opportunity Stanislaus and by the City of Oakdale in the implementation of the Countywide Economic Development Plan and Marketing Strategy first adopted on August 27, 2017 and the OS 2017-2020 Strategic Plan approved on August 27, 2017.

Specifically, Opportunity Stanislaus:

- 1. Will conduct economic development activities to encourage the development of new business opportunities, the attraction of new businesses and the retention and expansion of existing business within the City of Oakdale;
- 2. Will continue with the Local Industry Program for the business in Oakdale and will include representative of the City on those interactive visits;
- Will provide the City of Oakdale with on-going market and economic analyses through the OS Resource Center on a variety of important business sector topics based on the City of Oakdale's priorities and goals. Information will be used at the City's discretion (annual budget document, Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy, as well as other reports);
- 4. Will coordinate collaborative visits, recruitment trips and trade show participation for such events as the Processors Convention, ICSC events, other retail trade shows;

- 5. Will support and coordinate with the City of Oakdale on workforce support efforts such as in partnering on hiring events, holding workforce related events to support local employers as well as other types of training for local businesses;
- 6. Will partner with Oakdale on Prospect visits by continuing to involve City of Oakdale in prospect meetings Trade show participation recruitment trips Retail trade show support and partnership with ICSC Partner with Opportunity Stanislaus on providing support on direct leads to the City of Oakdale;
- 7. Will support the City of Oakdale in its applications for EDA grant funds as well as actively participate on the Economic Development Action Committee (EDAC) and assigned responsibilities and coordination (Comprehensive Economic Development Strategy, San Joaquin Valley Economic Development District, Economic Development Administration, etc.);
- 8. Will facilitate, in a transparent manner all potential development and prospect leads as well as provide an update or status on previous leads that were circulated and responded to by the City of Oakdale;
- Will advocate for the establishment of an effective Entrepreneurial Program at CSU Stanislaus. Will actively explore the feasibility of having at least one dedicated Small Business Development Center (SBDC) staffer located in Oakdale to serve the Oakdale business community;
- OS quarterly progress reports shall be submitted on four times a year basis describing activities in business attraction, business assistance/expansion and business advocacy efforts provided by the OS Research Office, the Business Services Unit and the Small Business Development Center. These Quarterly Reports will be submitted on or before the following due dates during this performance cycle:
 - o Quarter #1: September 30, each year 2017-2021;
 - o Quarter #2: January 5, each year 2017-2021;
 - o Quarter #3: March 30, each year 2017-2021; and
 - o Quarter #4: June 30, 2016 each year 2017-2021

These reports will provide ongoing, updated information to the City of Oakdale relative to the progress of the aforementioned Marketing Strategy as well as the adopted OS Program of Work for Fiscal Years 2017-2021. These reports will include the current focus of the campaign as well as the number and type of responses received; and,

11. The Opportunity Stanislaus CEO and SBDC Director will make an annual report to the Mayor and City Council to report on progress and accomplishments generated through this agreement.

Specifically, the City of Oakdale:

- Will assist in providing the required and timely staff support based on the availability
 of staff resources and the City of Oakdale's specific priorities in response to stated
 business needs as they pertain to existing companies or new firms interested in
 relocation or expansion to the area;
- Will facilitate ease of access and assistance to all businesses with regards to zoning and permitting in compliance with City of Oakdale adopted land use regulations and building codes and consistent with Oakdale's adopted growth and land use policies and objectives;
- 3. Will provide current data as it relates to changes in land use issues, infrastructure upgrades, zoning, fee structure or any other jurisdictional actions which assist in meeting the stated objectives of this Memorandum of Understanding and that impact the ability to respond to stated business issues and concerns;
- Will commit to interact with the OS Marketing Team to the level of capability based on staffing, time and monetary constraints. Participation will be at a level deemed appropriate based on any restraints as defined;
- 5. Will encourage elected officials to engage in an active support of business park creation, job creation opportunities, job retention and new business development; and,
- 6. Make an annual investment in Opportunity Stanislaus and Valley Sierra Small Business Development Center (SBDC) in the amount of \$10,000 and \$7,000 respectively.

This MOU sets forth the current intentions of OS and the City of Oakdale with respect to the Fiscal Years 2017-2021 operations of OS. The further intent is to provide a general understanding of the levels of responsibility and interaction for each party to this agreement. The MOU is not a binding contract but rather a document to serve as a guideline for the implementation of the Countywide Economic Development Plan and Marketing Strategy. A critical element of this document is the ability for each party to engage in a level of flexibility in the full implementation of the referenced plans.

FIVE YEAR MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING BETWEEN OPPORTUNITY STANISLAUS AND THE CITY OF OAKDALE REGARDING ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT SERVICES PROVIDED BY OPPORTUNITY STANISLAUS TO THE CITY OF OAKDALE FOR THE YEARS 2017 TO 2021

Opportunity Stanislaus (OS) and the City of Oakdale, (CITY) intend to work together through the implementation of the Countywide Economic Development Plan and Marketing Strategy focused on business development activities throughout Stanislaus County. This 5 Year Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) serves as a guideline to describe the actions that both parties should take in order for the Economic Development Plan and Marketing Strategy to be successful.





During FY '16-'17, the Valley Sierra Small Business Development Center (SBDC), with support from City of Oakdale and Oakdale Chamber of Commerce operated an <u>enhanced</u> program to assist entrepreneurs and existing businesses in the City of Oakdale by providing **no-cost** one-on-one professional business consulting and low-cost business training programs directly in Oakdale. The SBDC continues to build upon the solid foundation established since this collaboration began in 2011.

One of the key elements that makes this program effective is the use of local consultants in the Oakdale/Stanislaus County area who are providing local residents assistance in Human Resource management, marketing, insurance and risk management, business plan development, and financial management and help securing Capital needed to grow their business. In addition, the SBDC brings in other specialized consultants into the community as needed to serve the needs of local business owners and residents wanting to start or grow a business. Workshops in Employment Laws, Quick Books (2 sessions), Marketing and Business Planning were held at the Chamber in the Spring of 2017.

As a direct result of the enhanced level of services offered through this program the SBDC has seen significant outcomes in many entrepreneurs and local businesses.

Oakdale Client Outcomes: July 1, 2016 - Jun 30th, 2017

36 clients received 216 hours of no-cost SBDC business consulting, (direct cost to the SBDC - \$10,800)

2 new businesses were started in Oakdale by SBDC clients during this period

Oakdale clients reported adding 7 new jobs and retaining 27 jobs as a result of SBDC assistance Oakdale clients reported over \$869,000 in increased sales as a result of SBDC assistance

3 Oakdale clients receive loans totaling \$482,563

5 workshops were held in Oakdale with over 50 persons attending. (direct cost to the SBDC - \$1,600)

Proposed July 1, 2017 - June 30, 2018 Program

8 times during the year, the SBDC will offer business workshops including QuickBooks, Social Media, Traditional Marketing, Access to Capital, Business Planning and other topics based on needs expressed by local businesses and residents. A 9-week Business Management course will again be offered in the fall at the Chamber. This course is specifically designed to help existing business owners learn to operate their businesses more profitably and efficiently. Course is scheduled to run from Sept -Nov, meeting each Monday evening from 6:00-8:30 at the Chamber.

Valley Sierra SBDC would like to continue working with the City and other community based partners to maintain an enhanced level of services in Oakdale for the '17-'18 fiscal year. To continue this successful program, Valley Sierra SBDC respectfully requests funding support in the amount of \$7,000 from the City. Environmental Impact Report SCH No. 2008201069

I. BACKGROUND

The North County Corridor project is a joint project by Caltrans and the Federal Highway Administration and is subject to state and federal environmental review requirements. As a result, project documentation has been prepared in compliance with both CEQA and NEPA. Caltrans is the lead agency under NEPA and the lead agency under CEQA.

Purpose and Need

The purpose of the project is to reduce existing and future traffic congestion in northern Stanislaus County, support the efficient movement of goods and services and improve interregional Travel as follows:

- Reduce average daily traffic volumes and current traffic congestion and accommodate anticipated future traffic on the existing SR-108 and the surrounding regional transportation network in Stanislaus County and the cities of Modesto, Riverbank, and Oakdale.
- Support the efficient movement of goods and services throughout the region for the benefit of the regional economy by providing a more direct and dependable truck route, increasing the average operating speeds of all vehicles, and reducing the number of areas of conflict between motorized traffic and non-motorized means of travel.
- Improve the efficiency of interregional travel by reducing travel times for long distance commuters, recreational traffic, and interregional goods movement.

The project has been identified as a necessary improvement to accommodate regional east-west traffic and to improve north-south connectivity in Stanislaus County and southern San Joaquin County. The current action is needed because:

Travel conditions in the region, including traffic congestion on existing SR-108, will
continue to worsen due to regional population growth and projected traffic volume
increases.



- Traffic congestion on existing truck routes (SR-108/SR-120) will continue to hinder the efficient movement of goods and services.
- Existing SR-108 is part of the interregional system, and interregional circulation will become increasingly constrained as travel times on existing SR-108 increase substantially with planned residential and employment growth.

Project Description:

The proposed project will connect SR-219 near Modesto to SR-120 near Oakdale. The NCC EIR/EIS document analyzes the four Build Alternatives (1A, 1B, 2A, and 2B) and the No-Build Alternative. The western end of all alternatives is at the SR-219 (Kiernan Avenue)/Tully Road intersection. The project is analyzed as three distinct segments for environmental evaluation purposes and explaining the proposed improvements. Segment 1 represents the more urbanized area; Segment 2 represents a transition from urbanized to rural area; and Segment 3 represents the rural foothill area.



Segment 1, which has the same western end for all Build Alternatives, begins at the SR-219 Kiernan Avenue/Tully Road intersection. All of the Build Alternatives proceed along the same alignment and have similar improvements to the vicinity of the existing Claus Road/Claribel Road intersection near the southeast portion of the City of Riverbank and northeast portion of the City of Modesto's future sphere of influence.

Segment 2 is where the four similar alternatives separate into two different alignments (1A/1B and 2A/2B). In Segment 2, Alternatives 1A and 1B veer northeast from near the existing Claus Road/Claribel Road intersection and pass through the southern boundary of the City of Oakdale to just east of Albers Road, and Alternatives 2A and 2B continue to extend easterly along Claribel Road and veer northeastward past the intersection of Claribel Road/Bentley Road to just east of Albers Road. Each of the alternatives then continues to the respective proposed eastern end (A and B).

In Segment 3, Alternatives 1A and 2A merge as similar alternatives at the southern end of the City of Oakdale and continue on the same alignment to the proposed eastern end (A) at the new SR-108/SR-120 intersection just east of the City of Oakdale boundary. In Segment 3, Alternatives 1B and 2B merge as similar alternatives north of the existing Warnerville Road/Emery Road intersection and continue on a northeasterly direction to the proposed other eastern end (B) at the new SR-108/SR-120 intersection west of the existing SR-120/Lancaster Road intersection.

Conagra Concerns:

At the September 5, 2017 City Council meeting representatives from Conagra expressed concerns related to Alternative 1B. The concerns were as follows:

- 1) The North County Corridor project will cause a loss of land currently used for the land application of water from tomato processing.
- 2) The North County Corridor project impacts may cause the California Regional Water Quality Control Board to require that Conagra amend its current waste water discharge permit.
- 3) The North County Corridor project may negatively impact the Oakdale plant's operations thus increasing its costs of managing the process water.

City staff takes these concerns very seriously and has met with Conagra representatives in person and on the phone several times over the last couple of weeks. A letter was drafted and sent to Conagra in order to show its commitment and support for its operations in Oakdale (Attachment D). City staff looks forward to working with Conagra to ensure that impacts to the Oakdale plant caused by the NCC project are addressed and mitigated.

II. DISCUSSION

On October 3, 2016, the Oakdale City Council discussed, deliberated, and received public testimony regarding the four (4) route alternatives considered in the NCC EIR/EIS. In summary, Resolution No. 2016-117 offers preliminary support of alignment Alternatives 1B and 2B and adopts the following "guiding principles" when selecting the locally preferred alternative:

City staff has spent considerable time and effort to review and evaluate the NCC EIR/EIS. Based on our review, City staff believes Route Alternative 1B is the preferred alternative that has the least negative impact on the goals and policies of the City's 2030 General Plan. In addition, Route Alternative 1B achieves the "guiding principles" adopted by the Oakdale City Council in October 2016.

Route Alternative 1B displaces the least amount of homes and businesses, as referenced throughout the EIR/EIS, notable Table 2.4-1, Comparison of Alternatives. Thus, Route Alternative 1B assists in minimizing relocation efforts and costs for homes and business affected by the NCC.


Route Alternative 1B also connects to the City's Future Specific Plan Area 5, along Crane Road, and the City's South Oakdale Industrial Specific Plan area. The City's South Oakdale Industrial Specific Plan area is planned exclusively for industrial land uses. For the City's Future Specific Plan Area 5, the City's 2030 General Plan (Page LU-52) anticipates a commercial site along Crane Road to accommodate future connections to the NCC. Thus, Route Alternative 1B and its future connections to the City of Oakdale accommodates connections to existing and planned industrial and commercial land uses, thereby eliminating any connection to existing or planned residential neighborhoods.

Route Alternative 1B is primarily located south of the City's existing core, while providing connections for future growth areas of the City. Route Alternative 1B also provides its connection to State Route 120 near Lancaster Road. This alternative achieves this "guiding principal" simply by its design, by diverting traffic around the City of Oakdale, and connecting easterly of the Oakdale Community at Lancaster Road/State Route 120.

The City has reviewed Alternative 1B in comparison to its 2030 General Plan, the adopted Bridle Ridge Specific Plan, Future Specific Plan Area 5, the adopted South Oakdale Industrial Specific Plan, and the adopted Sierra Pointe Specific Plan. The City believes Route Alternative 1B has the least impact on these policy documents, and in general, is consistent with these documents. While Route Alternative 1B provides connection to Crane Road (the westerly boundary of the Bridle Ridge Specific Plan), its connection point is south of this Specific Plan area and is primarily located within the City's Future Specific Plan Area. The City's 2030 General Plan contemplated this connection, by providing land use guidance for this future Specific Plan area as it relates to the location of the NCC/Crane Road connection.


Current and Future Specific Plan Area Map

Impacts of NCC Alternative 1A on the Sierra Pointe Specific Plan





- Has the least amount of impact to the City's General Plan and various Specific Plan documents.
- Estimated costs of Alternative 1B is lower than Alternative 2B by \$11 million

We appreciate the ongoing opportunity to continue to play an active role in the review and administration of the NCC in our county and community.

Similar to the City of Riverbank, the City of Oakdale continues to remain concerned regarding the potential transfer of any long-term liabilities associated with the future CALTRANS relinquishment of SR 108 to local government for management and maintenance. This of course includes any responsibilities for current and ongoing issues and potential storm drainage treatment necessary to satisfy the Regional Water Quality Control Board.

In addition, this is of specific importance to the City of Oakdale within its City limits, west of the SR 108/SR 120 intersection. The City's 2030 General Plan designates this section of SR 108 primarily for commercial land uses, highlighted by existing commercial uses along this corridor and planned land uses for the adopted Crane Crossing Specific Plan. Thus, the City is concerned with the lack of analysis associated with the potential loss of commercial revenue associated with the relocation of SR 108 in the proposed locations.

The EIR/EIS comments provided herein are organized into three (3) sections; Background, EIR/EIS Comments, and Conclusion.

Background:

On October 3, 2016, the Oakdale City Council discussed, deliberated, and received public testimony regarding the four (4) route alternatives considered in the NCC EIR/EIS. Upon receiving a significant amount of public testimony, the City Council, by a vote of 4-0, adopted Resolution No. 2016-117 (attached herein). In summary, Resolution No. 2016-117 offers preliminary support of alignment Alternatives 1B and 2B and adopts the following "guiding principles" when selecting the locally preferred alternative:

- An alternative that minimizes the number of homes/properties that need to be acquired;
- An alternative that does not tie into or terminate at a residential neighborhood;
- An alternative that routes a majority of NCC traffic around the Oakdale community;
- An alternative that has the least amount of impact to the City's General Plan and various Specific Plan documents; and,
- An alternative with no roundabout.

Resolution No. 2016-117 is attached herein, and the City respectfully requests that it be included in the administrative record prepared as part of the NCC EIR/EIS.

EIR/EIS Comments:

Below are detailed comments prepared by City of Oakdale staff and as discussed with the Oakdale City Council, on the released NCC EIR/EIS, dated August 2017. Each comment below references the NCC EIR/EIS page number.

Pages 25 and 26

Pages 25 and 26 assume SR 108 improvements under the NCC "No-Build Alternative." These improvements include; Widening from Maag Avenue to Stearns Road from 2 to 4 lanes, and traffic signal improvements east of Oakdale at the intersections of Atlas, Dillwood, Stearns, and Orange Blossom Roads.

The City of Oakdale's adopted Streets Master Plan and Capital Facilities Fee Nexus Study includes the following improvements: Widening F Street from a 2 lane facility to a 5 lane facility from Maag Avenue to Atlas. The 5 lane facility allows for two travel lanes in each direction, and a middle turn lane.

It appears the NCC EIR/EIS omits these improvements.

Page 31

Do the projected costs include Agricultural Mitigation Fees and mitigation fees for the loss of biological resources (i.e. sensitive species, etc.) habitat?

Page 44

Reference is made to Figure 3.1.1.1-2, illustrating the pattern of land use within the "Affected Environment." While the Figure illustrates the Crane Crossing Specific Plan, East F Street Corridor Specific Plan, the Sierra Pointe Specific Plan, and the South Oakdale Industrial Specific Plan, it does not illustrate Future Specific Plan Area 5, which is discussed subsequently in the document on Pages 46 and 47. Future Specific Plan Area 5 should be included in Figure 3.1.1.1-2, and contemplated as part of the "Affected Environment" if it is not. The City also respectfully requests clarification if the NCC Traffic Model assumes the accurate amount and type of land uses within the City's future growth areas, including land use assumptions for the Future Specific Plan Area 5.

In addition, this Figure illustrates existing development, such as the Riverbank Industrial Complex. In this regard, this Figure, and the NCC EIR/EIS "Affected Environment" and subsequent environmental analysis should include existing developments in the City of Oakdale, such as the Blue Diamond facility and ConAgra. Both facilities are located within the City's industrial area, along S. Yosemite Avenue, near where future NCC connections are planned under Alternatives 1A and 1B.

Pages 46 and 47

Table 3.1.1.1-1 – Future Projects depicts that the Sierra Pointe Specific Plan, East F Street Corridor Specific Plan, and Crane Crossing Specific Plan are "Future Project/Master Planned" while other projects such as the South Oakdale Industrial Specific Plan is noted as "Adopted."

The Sierra Pointe Specific Plan, East F Street Corridor Specific Plan, and Crane Crossing Specific Plan have all been adopted by the City of Oakdale. Thus, they should be referenced as "Pending Implementation." In the case of the East F Street Corridor Specific Plan, development within this Specific Plan has commenced, with the current development of an active-adult residential project known as Tesoro. The document should accurately reflect the current status of these projects. In addition, please note, this reference as "Future Project/Master Planned" for these Specific Plans is made throughout the document, and should be corrected.

Page 76

This page provides a brief summary of future growth areas in the City of Oakdale, including the South Oakdale Industrial Specific Plan, Crane Crossing Specific Plan, Sierra Pointe Specific Plan, and Future Specific Plan Area 5. The existing status of the future growth areas is as follows:

- South Oakdale Industrial Specific Plan The entire South Oakdale Industrial Specific Plan area is located within the existing City limits, and is zoned for Light Industrial and Limited Industrial land uses.
- Crane Crossing Specific Plan A portion of this Specific Plan has been annexed into the City of Oakdale. The area noted as the "South Area" in the Specific Plan is within the existing City limits.

- Sierra Pointe Specific Plan As noted previously, this Specific Plan has been adopted by the City of Oakdale, and is a potential future annexation area.
- Future Specific Plan Area 5 The EIR/EIS is correct that Future Specific Plan Area 5 contains approximately 707-acres, and is planned for a variety of land uses, including low, medium, and high density residential, commercial, parks, and an elementary school. The City's 2030 Oakdale General Plan (Pages LU-52 and LU-53) also notes the Specific Plan Area's importance to providing commercial opportunities and circulation connections to the NCC. In this regard, the City believes Alternative 1B provides this connection at Crane Road, achieves compliance with the City's 2030 General Plan, and preserves the City Council's guiding principles outlined in Resolution No. 2016-117.

The document should be revised to accurately reflect the City's future growth areas as noted above.

Page 96

This page identifies "planned residential development areas in the vicinity of the proposed project" but does not include remaining residential development within the adopted Bridle Ridge Specific Plan, nor the Future Specific Plan Area 5. It is important to note that planned residential development within the Bridle Ridge Specific Plan include approved Tentative Subdivision Maps.

The discussion referenced on this page should be revised to accurately reflect planned residential development for the City of Oakdale.

Page 105

The document states that Alternatives 1B and 2B would relocate 114 homes under these route alternatives. This represents the least number of homes that would be required to be relocated, as opposed to Alternatives 1A and 2A that will relocate 124 homes and 136 homes respectively. The City of Oakdale is in favor of a route alternative that results in the minimal number of homes and businesses that need to be acquired and/or relocated.

Page 108

Table 3.1.4.1-10 – Business Affected by the Project

As noted previously by the City's comment above on Page 44, this table does not include business located in the City of Oakdale, notably businesses located within the City's industrial area along the S. Yosemite Avenue Corridor. The document should address how these businesses will be affected by the NCC.



I would like to thank you and your team for attending the Oakdale City Council meeting on Tuesday, September 5, 2017 and for meeting with me and my colleagues from the City of Oakdale and Stanislaus County on Thursday, September 7, 2017.

I believe the dialogue from these meetings was very positive and gave us all a better understanding of the circumstances and impacts that will result from the North County Corridor (NCC) highway project.

The City of Oakdale appreciates the great commitment that Conagra has shown to our community and the tremendous contributions that it has made to Oakdale for over a century. I am committed to working together with Conagra as the NCC project moves forward. I plan to advocate for a project that addresses and mitigates all impacts to the Conagra plant in Oakdale. In our conversations the following Conagra concerns were identified:

- 1) The North County Corridor project will cause a loss of land currently used for the land application of water from tomato processing.
- 2) The North County Corridor project impacts may cause the California Regional Water Quality Control Board to require that Conagra amend its current waste water discharge permit.
- 3) The North County Corridor project may negatively impact the Oakdale plant's operations thus increasing its costs of managing the process water.

With that in mind City staff is committed to working with the Conagra to ensure that any NCC impacts to its operations in Oakdale are addressed and mitigated. Additionally, City staff will not support the start of construction of any NCC alternative until Conagra is made whole. The City welcomes the opportunity for continued dialogue with Conagra moving forward so that a mutually beneficial outcome of the NCC is realized.

In an effort to highlight the work being done by all City Departments, City staff provides monthly activity reports to the City Council at the 2nd City Council meeting of each month. These reports are included in the agenda packet as an informational item but council members are encouraged to ask questions about any of the items listed in the report. The purpose of these reports is to help keep the City Council and the public apprised of the work being done in all areas of city operations.

Administration Department Activities

- Marijuana Workshop: An educational workshop on the Adult Use Marijuana Act was held on Monday, April 10, 2017. A presentation was given by the City's legal counsel on the aspects of the new laws on marijuana use. A special City Council Meeting has been scheduled to discuss this topic in more detail on Thursday, April 27, 2017 at 6pm at the City Council Chambers located at 277 North 2nd Avenue. The special City Council meeting on April 27, 2017 was attended by about 30 people. The majority of those in attendance were from Oakdale. The City has developed a Cannabis Pilot Program Application process for individuals interested in opening a cannabis related business in Oakdale. Currently all commercial cannabis operations are banned in Oakdale. The application process was implemented to find out if and what type of businesses are interested in coming to the City of Oakdale. Pre-submittal conference were held on Tuesday, May 30th and Wednesday, June 14th. Over 150 individuals attended the meetings. Proposals are due on Monday, June 19, 2017. The proposals were presented to the Economic Development Committee on Friday, August 11, 2017. Staff received feedback and will share that with the City Council Cannabis Ad Hoc Committee that will now review those proposals. UPDATE: The City Manager met with the City Council Cannabis Ad Hoc Committee on August 21st. It is anticipated that a draft cannabis ordinance will be presented to the City Council at its October 2nd meeting.
- Attended meeting on August 23, 2017 with Visionary Builders who are leading the effort to build a multifamily housing project on East J Street and Pedersen Road. The developer continues to work with the Housing Authority and Stanislaus County to finalize the details and funding for the project.
- Attended NIMS training at the Office of Emergency Services in Modesto on August 24, 2017.

- On August 28, 2017 attended a meeting at Trever and D Street with engineers and the right of way agent to discuss the next steps to acquire the right-of-way needed to construct the D Street extension from Trever Avenue to Stearns Road.
- Attended special StanCOG Management and Finance Committee meeting on Thursday, August 31, 2017 to discuss SB 1 and Measure L transportation funding processes and procedures.
- Reviewed miscellaneous community traffic concerns with the Traffic Issue Review Committee on Thursday, August 31, 2017.
- Reviewed and approved staff reports and for the September 5, 2017 City Council meeting.
- Met with representatives from ConAgra and Stanislaus County to discuss the North County Corridor. ConAgra shared some concerns regarding the proposed North County Corridor project as it has some impacts to ConAgra's production operations. In the meeting with the County the County representatives indicated that the environmental impact report process requires that all impacts to ConAgra be addressed and mitigated. City staff will continue to work with ConAgra to ensure that this is the case.

PATROL

Officers responded to and investigated several habitual transient offender (HTO) complaints in August. In an effort to increase responsiveness to challenges in the downtown business area, Reserve Officer Mike Freudenthal, was assigned as the Downtown Community Resource Officer. Downtown businesses were instructed to call 911 for an immediate response to in-progress incidents and to coordinate with Reserve Officer Freudenthal during foot patrol visits, via phone, via text, or email on issues of concern not in need of an immediate response. This position, along with officers doing foot patrols throughout the area, has been effective in combating and reducing nuisance violations; however, staff continues to work on ways to creatively address these issues by reaching out to mental health resources, working with ABC and the Courts, and utilizing civil remedies with the objective of improving how we capture and track data on these issues so the department can continue to size up and respond in an informed manner. We are also looking at increasing our community policing efforts by expanding this type of problem solving response to other areas of the city through longer-term Problem Oriented Policing (POP) projects.

We will continue to proactively meet the challenges in the downtown area by scheduling additional reserve officers and bike patrols, when staffing allows and continue to investigate complaints and make contact with the homeless population daily for purposes of outreach, security checks and enforcement.

 Working in partnership with the Stanislaus County Auto Theft Task Force (StanCATT) to address an uptick in auto thefts, a bait car was deployed here in Oakdale last month. StanCATT is a proactive countywide auto theft investigative unit. The taskforce is funded by Assembly Bill 183, which provides for a small portion of vehicle registration fees in Stanislaus County. This is a user fee which does not impact local budgets or burden revenue funds.

According to the National Insurance Crime Bureau's 2016 list of top 10 hot spots for vehicle thefts, the Modesto Metropolitan Area ranks number 2 in the state and number 4 in the nation in thefts per capita. Programs such as StanCATT, enhance the capacity of local police and prosecutors to deter, investigate, and prosecute vehicle theft crimes.

 Officers continue to provide extra patrol and traffic enforcement in areas where complaints of speeding, stop sign running, and motor failing to stop for pedestrians are reported, including around the High School, Bardo Avenue at G Street, and West F St and North Lee Ave.

EVENTS AND PROJECTS

The Department continues to move forward on the COPLINK Data Source Integration Services Program and are working to train all personnel on the system and start utilizing the full capacity of the program. IBM and Datapath, along with Project Manager Janeen Yates, continue to work on the interfacing of the COPLINK program anticipate the program should be fully functional sometime in the next few months.

In conjunction with the COPLINK program, we will be implementing the APBnet program within the next several weeks. APBnet is a photo bulletin alert system used by local, state, and federal law enforcement agencies across the nation to quickly create, distribute, and share informational bulletins for wanted or missing persons, stolen property or vehicles, gang activity, attempted scams, etc., all within real-time. Users can also search bulletin archives for case information and leads.

• On 8/18/2017, we partnered with the California Alcohol Beverage Control (ABC) on a joint Minor Decoy/Shoulder Tap Operation at local retail establishments throughout the city of Oakdale to ensure they were following state law on underage alcohol sales. These "compliance checks" are a requirement of the ABC grant the department was recently awarded. The operation involved an underage person, under the direct supervision of the Police Department, entering a store and

attempting to purchase alcohol. We are pleased to announce that we had 100% compliance with all businesses visited.

Underage drinking is a serious matter in communities across our country and local leaders as well as the business community must be mindful of the inherent dangers of this issue. The Oakdale Police Department, in partnership with California Alcohol Beverage Control, is determined for all young people to have a safe and healthy school year and appreciates the efforts of all participating retail establishments for their compliance with the law and not selling alcohol to minors.

- Working in collaboration with the Office of Emergency Services and the Department of Homeland Security, staff received several bids for the build out of the Greger Road Radio Tower project. We are hopeful work will begin sometime toward the end of November or beginning of December. Funding from the Homeland Security Grant is expected to cover the majority of costs.
- Staff along with SRO Taylor are currently working together to develop a safety awareness training at the high school.
- We continue to move forward on developing a Crisis Negotiating Team (CNT).
 Memos of interest were received from department personnel and testing will take
 place sometime late September or early October. The CNT will provide skilled
 verbal communicators with expertise training to de-escalate and effect surrender
 in critical situations and will complement the recently established Rapid Response
 Team.
- The Department expects to roll out the Drop the Drugs Prescription Medication
 Disposal Program the end of September or early October. With the enactment of
 the new Ordinance 1249 authorizing the program, the drop box will be placed in
 the lobby to provide for the safe disposal of unwanted, unused, or expired
 pharmaceutical controlled substances.
- Staff continues to work with the City of Riverbank on updating the contract and budget for the Animal Services Contract.
- PSC Hilgen and Administrative Detective Sgt. Savage are approximately 2/3 completed with their inventory audit of the evidence room.
- PSC Hilgen continues to work with the Public Services Department on the range building and on drainage system issues at the range. A city council staff report

requesting repairs and improvements for various issues at the range will be forthcoming.

With the start of the school year, Officer Dan Taylor began his School Resource Officer duties on 8/10/17. He is assigned to all school in the Oakdale School District, the four elementary schools, Jr. High, East Stanislaus and the High School, and alternates his time between each. For the month of August, SRO Taylor reported he assisted patrol on several incidents including a couple of runaway issues at the High School and with a junior high student who reported being chased by two adults after school. He also worked on a case involving damage done to vehicles driven by OHS students, one near the campus and the other near Taco Bell. The cost of damage made the crime a felony and after a long investigation, he was able to locate and identify the suspect and obtained a full confession. The suspect in the case was a juvenile non-student and was booked for the two felonies. He reported that the first football game and first dance went very well with no incidents reported.

SRO Taylor's reported stats are:

- 19 incidents
- 4 cases
- 2 arrests
- 2 home visits
- Staff expects to receive a new 2018 Ford Interceptor that was approved at the 5/15/17 City Council meeting. The vehicle is scheduled to be outfitted and placed in service sometime early October.
- The Department is joining over 100 other police agencies this upcoming October by participating in the "Pink Patch Project". The "Pink Patch Project" is a nationwide, public awareness campaign designed to bring attention to the fight against breast cancer and to support breast cancer research organizations in combating this devastating disease. Officers at participating departments wear pink patches on their regular uniforms for the entire month of October each year during "Breast Cancer Awareness Month." The pink patches are intended to stimulate conversation with the community and to encourage public awareness about the importance of early detection and the on-going fight against this disease. Oakdale PD will be partnering with local charity and support group "Blue Line Wives" on this project in an effort to raise funds for cancer research, treatment, and education through the sale of commemorative pink department patches during the month of October.

RECRUITMENT

- We would like to congratulate Serena Van Dyke on her appointment to full-time Public Safety Dispatcher. Serena was hired in February 2016 working in a part-time capacity so we are excited to have her here as a full-time team member. Congratulations Serena! We also welcome our new part-time Animal Shelter Attendant, Jamie Glaze, to the OPD team. Welcome Jamie!
- In efforts to build solid eligibility lists for both Public Safety Dispatcher and Police
 Officer positions, we will be holding recruitments for these positions. We are also
 working on conducting interviews for the vacant Crossing Guard position. CAPS
 members have been asked to assist until the Crossing Guard position can be
 staffed permanently.

ONGOING

- Patrol Officers continue to attend Neighborhood Watch meetings.
- We continue to hold ongoing recruitment for CAPS and Explorer members.
- Several staff members attended various trainings in August:
 - The department hosted a Glock Armorers class on 8/15/17 at the Community Center.
 - The K9 unit attended a HITS conference in San Francisco 8/27-30/17. The conference consisted of legal updates, trends, court testimony, search technique, and liability.
 - o One officer attended ARIDE training in Ripon 8/9-10/17.
 - CAPS members attended Homicide and Crimes Against Children training at the Sheriff's Office.
- Staff received the graffiti report for the month of August from the city's TAG (Team-up Against Graffiti) coordinator Mike Hancock. He reported there were twelve graffiti incidents in the month of August with one still outstanding on the sound wall of West F Street near Reed Road. He reported that removal has been difficult due to the type of wall the graffiti is on so support from the Public Services Department was requested. The greatest concentrations of graffiti for the month of August were Gilbert Park and West F Street. There was no gang graffiti located during the month. A map showing graffiti incidents for August is attached (Attachment C).



Workers' Compensation

We currently have two members on Workers' Compensation, both are assigned to Fire Administration working modified duty under the direction of the Deputy Chief and Fire Chief. One Captain was working directly with me to further develop and enhance our Public Information Division and continues building working relationships with all media outlets. He was also directing the process to finish up our website and update all social media sites.

Administrative Assistant II Recruitment

The recruitment closed last week and applications have been screened by the agency handling the process. We will be scheduling a written examination in the near future, followed by an oral panel interview with assistance from outside agencies to conduct interviews and forward results to my office. The top three candidates will be scheduled for a Chief Interview. Vice President Guzman has agreed to be an observer throughout the oral interview panel.

Administration

We are working on a realignment plan for the office and command staff. This includes shifting responsibilities and duties, along with supporting and strengthening our current team. The goal is to bring our span of control within acceptable limits and become more effective and efficient with our current staff. Finance has been moved back into the main office to provide a more efficient link between Finance and my office.

Chief Wise will be reassigned to Administration for a period of time (TBD) to assist us with the realignment plan.

I currently meet weekly with the Modesto Fire Chief and the City Manager from Oakdale to continue to build relationships and discuss ways to provide a high level of service throughout the Resource Sharing Community.

I attended several important meetings this month including the Resource Sharing Executive Committee Meeting, Resource Sharing Steering Committee, Resource Sharing Background and Overview Meetings in Modesto.

Other meetings I participated in included staff meetings, Local 3399 Executive Board Meeting, coffee with Sheriff Christianson, Oakdale Fire District Fire Board Meeting and lunch with Mayor O'Brien and City Manager Scully from Riverbank.

I attended the candlelight vigil for the fallen Modesto Police Officer and several meetings with Valley Home and Knights Ferry citizens. I also spoke at the Leadership Oakdale program on behalf of the District.

Current Operational Items:

The 2017 Fire Season continues to be very active over the last month. The District has assisted with numerous deployments in all areas of the State. Currently we still have 1 Engine and 1 Brush committed to incidents with possible release within the next few days as well as 2 overhead assignments still active with the REMS Module being released within the next day or so.

During a recent conference call with Cal-OES and the Region 4 cooperators the following count was given as to the resources that are currently deployed across the state of California.

14 Major fires burning within the State

263,000 acres currently burned

11,000 structures threatened

10,853 Personnel assigned

25 OES Strike Teams deployed

51 Local Government Strike Teams deployed

612 Overhead positions assigned

6 National Guard helicopters on order

We are continuing at the district level as well as the Operational Area Coordinator level to monitor the situation and act accordingly to not only provide necessary coverage for the district but within the regional & state level as well. It will remain to be a very active fire season moving forward until measurable precipitation is recorded within the state.

The new Water Tender training has concluded and the apparatus has been placed into service. We still continue to receive various inquiries in regards to the surplus and selling of the old Water Tender 24.

Multiple agencies came to show their respect for fallen MPD officer Mike Pershall at the candle light vigil at Bel Passi baseball fields. Officer Pershall was tragically killed by a suspected drunk driver on Merle Ave. C2 & Quint 22 also assisted with the Lakewood burial ceremonies.

Staff Continues to work with insurance adjusters to resolve the damage received to E24 during a fire at A&B Truck in Modesto. The engine received significant damage as result of a fire in the building.

Staff continues to work through small items needing correction within the Paramedic program. The program continues to be a huge success for the district and will continue to improve as we move forward. With the recent departure of Paramedic Barnes from district service, we will be hiring to replace his vacant position.

Staff continues to work with CPFG as well as the City of Riverbank on two significant projects: Cross Roads West Development and the new Impact & Development fees district-wide.

Additional information will be brought forward in the future as it is developed.

<u>Community Events:</u> Operational personnel assisted in numerous community events over the past 30 days. The following events were held throughout the fire district:

- Red Cross recently held a successful blood drive at Station #28 with another one scheduled in the very near future for Riverbank.
- Staff continues to work with the City of Riverbank on the 2017 Cheese & Wine Festival.
- Numerous citizen ride-a-longs as well as station tours have been conducted at all station locations.

Explorer Post 3399: The explorers continue to train on the various aspects of the fire service participating in wildland hose drills and additional crew drills with shift personnel. The explorer program continues to be an important component of operational support for the paid staff while assisting throughout daily operations and responses.
